Urogynaecologist (Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery Sub-Specialist)

The Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, University of British Columbia, is seeking applications for a clinical faculty position in Urogynaecology within the Division of Gynaecologic Specialties, based at St. Paul's Hospital. The successful applicant will work as part of a clinical academic team providing urogynaecology expertise and treatment to the Province of British Columbia. The successful applicant will have gynaecologic privileges at both St. Paul's Hospital and B.C. Women's Hospital, and obstetric privileges at St. Paul's Hospital.

The UBC Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology has a well developed Urogynaecology program within the Division of Gynaecologic Specialties. It provides the full scope of diagnosis and treatment for female pelvic floor disorders. It is also active academically, providing surgical and nonsurgical training in urogynaecology through two dedicated residency rotations, as well as a two year Advanced Training Program in Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery. This is one of the most heavily sought after postgraduate training programs in Urogynaecology within Canada. There is also a well funded research program that includes research in clinical outcomes, obstetrical trauma, and surgical education. While members of the Urogynaecology Program are based at several academic centres in the lower Mainland, St. Paul's Hospital has been the academic heart of the program for more than 15 years.

The successful candidate will be a licensed Obstetrician/Gynaecologist that has pursued additional postgraduate training in urogynecology. Evidence of proficiency and interest in teaching is essential while, research activity is desired. Ideally, the role will be expected to fully participate in the Obstetric Program. Preference will be given to a Urogynaecologist who has a diversity of training experience and has demonstrated productivity.

Reporting is to the Head of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at St. Paul's Hospital, to the Head of the Division of Gynaecologic Specialties, and to the Head of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at UBC.

It is expected that the successful candidate will apply for and hold a clinical faculty appointment in the Department of Obstetrics & Gynaecology at the University of British Columbia. As a clinical faculty member, the successful candidate will be expected to involve learners in clinical activity, and participate in program development and student evaluation as well as research and knowledge dissemination.

The position is funded by fee and service through the Medical Services Plan of British Columbia with stipends paid for clinical teaching.

Applicants must be eligible for registration with the College of Physicians and Surgeons of British Columbia, be a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada or equivalent and be eligible to hold a clinical faculty appointment at UBC.

Review of applications will begin on August 15, 2022 and continue until the position is filled. The anticipated start date for this position is November 1, 2022.
